It's important for both elected and appointed officials to make sure that development is controlled and deliberate. Prior to my election to City Council, I served on the Waterville Civil Service Commission. Previously, I was a member of the Board of Education of the Anthony Wayne Local School District from 2000 to 2008, serving as President for two years and as Vice-president. I have been engaged in the private practice of law for over 35 years with the firm Shindler Neff LLP, concentrating in the areas of business, estate planning, probate administration, and real estate.</p> <p><b>Questions:</b></p> <p>1) Waterville continues to grow geographically and in the number of residents. We must be mindful of the continued maintenance of our superior public services, including police and fire protection, public works, and infrastructure preservation. Cautious oversight of land-use planning will also be important. Construction to replace the bridge over the Maumee River will begin in 2018 and we must take appropriate steps to minimize the disruption to our residents. Our voters are deeply concerned about the impact of the NEXUS gas pipeline which is planned to pass through Waterville and we must invoke the Charter Amendment that was passed by voters last November.</p> <p>2) My wife, Debbie, and I have been proud residents of Waterville since March of 1980. We raised our three children in Waterville, and they all graduated from Anthony Wayne High School. We have been very active in the community. Currently, I am a member of the Board of Trustees of The Anthony Wayne Youth Foundation, and was a founding member. I also continue to serve as a board member of the Anthony Wayne Youth Soccer League. I was a founding trustee of the Anthony Wayne Education Association.</p>
